LETTER FROM THE MINISTER

Western Australia is one of the best places in the world to be a recreational fisher. With so many great table and sport species, idyllic beaches and waterways and unrivalled weather, the State is an angler's dream.

Generating a significant economic contribution for WA each year, and providing countless other social benefits, it's vital that we protect the aquatic resources the recreational fishing industry rolling on

My focus is on sustainably managing our State's prized fisheries, so that our children and grandchildren can enjoy the fishing trips and days out on the boat that we are so lucky to enjoy now.

I want to strike the right balance between managing our fish stocks and maximising fisher experience.

The recent decision to increase the herring bag limit from 12 to 20 is a great example of this balance. Decisive action to recover the herring stock with a 50 per cent reduction in catch in 2015 meant we were able to recover stocks and safeguard their future. Herring is a real 'bread and butter' fish – one that's caught by families up and down the coast. Those families can now take home a great feed. Recreational fishers should be proud, having played a big role in this success story.

The McGowan Government is working to make WA's recreational fishing experience even better. Recently we hit an important milestone – with 75,000 yellowtail kingfish released into metro waters. Working with Recfishwest over the past two years, the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) Aquaculture R&D team has capitalised on their extensive knowledge and experience with the species.

Recfishwest's Snapper Guardians program continues to be a great success, with more than 200,000 fingerlings released into Cockburn Sound since 2015. Funded through the Recreational Fishing Initiatives Fund, the program also promotes research into this prized fish.

We're also investing in stocking freshwater waterways. Harvey Dam will soon be home to 100,000 more marron. With support from Recfishwest, broodstock have already been sourced from the dam and it is expected the juveniles will be released before the end of 2023. The Government has also committed more than \$300,000 to undertake an economic analysis of the freshwater recreational fishing sector and develop a business case to upgrade the Pemberton Freshwater Research Centre to boost trout restocking programs and tourism across the South-West.

The social and economic benefits of recreational fishing were also recognised in the State's Covid-19 recovery plan. Under the plan, \$3 million was allocated to build artificial reefs in regional areas. DPIRD are currently working with Recfishwest to put in place reefs off Kalbarri, Albany and Broome, which will be a major tourism drawcard into the future.

Prior to the 2021 election, the Premier committed to the creation of a recreational fishing development plan for WA. The plan will help to drive innovation, maximise tourism potential and lead recreational fishing investments. With support from DPIRD, Recfishwest has been working on fulfilling this important commitment and it is fantastic to see the Fishing Development Plan come to fruition.

I'd also like to thank Recfishwest for their input on west coast demersal scalefish management. Their insight into the sector is invaluable and the feedback and recommendations they provided will all be incorporated into the final management arrangements. This is a complex issue and I am committed to safeguarding the future of these fish species for future generations.



CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Welcome to the Recfishwest Annual Report for 2021/22, and on behalf of the Board I am delighted to present another packed report reflecting a big year for Recfishwest and WA fishing.

In my first report as Chairman, I must acknowledge outgoing Chairman Tim Bray's huge contribution to Recfishwest over nine years of service on the Board with seven years in the Chair. Tim was critical in evolving Recfishwest's strategic direction and setting our culture, while ensuring the organisation has become a highly professional and highly regarded organisation at the top level.

This has seen Recfishwest's influence shift from being a sidebar in the decision-making process to being right at its heart, driving the agenda for change to attain the best outcomes possible for our community.

I also acknowledge the continued efforts and commitment of my fellow Board members and the highly capable Recfishwest staff whose continued expertise, strategic input, outputs and effort ensures Recfishwest's solid reputation as a trustworthy, professional organisation with whom all stakeholders can work is maintained.

Tim's are big shoes to step into indeed, but I am relishing the challenge of stepping up to the plate in what is already shaping up to be a very interesting and challenging era of this organisation's and WA's history. It is an era in which increasing pressures of modern life underscores just how important the recreation and well-being that fishing provides is for hundreds of thousands of West Aussies.

This was evidenced by the record response we had to our survey on the future of the west coast demersal scalefish fishery with nearly 6,000 West Aussie fishers giving their time freely to provide input into the first phase of the consultation process. This shows just how much recreational fishers care about the future of the fish that underpins the recreational fishing experiences they deeply value.

Tellingly, two of the main reasons the survey respondents gave as to why they value fishing for these species was because of the positive impact on their mental health and well-being and the time with family and friends it afforded them on the water. All of this points to an even greater imperative to ensure that publicly-owned fisheries should be sustainably managed in a way that provides the best social and economic return to WA – to put it simply, the biggest benefit to the biggest number of people.

To achieve this though, a fine balance needs to be struck that meets the increasing challenges of a growing population, social and environmental change, improved technology and the interests of other stakeholders.

Over the reporting period, we have been working hard behind the scenes to take fishing in a direction that meets these challenges by developing a shared vision for the future of WA recreational fishing with the State Government. This is why we welcome the Minister's endorsement of the Fishing Development Plan, an election commitment of this Government and evidence of their understanding of the importance that fishing plays in our community and economy.

The plan sets out a roadmap for creating more places to fish, more fish to catch and a management approach that maximises enjoyment, all within the boundaries of sustainable management.

The plan will give us a clear pathway ahead to the future but its success will depend on the extent our Government and non-government partners come to the party. The strength of the relationships and levels of trust we have built up with our partners should serve us well in this regard and we will ensure Recfishwest does everything to facilitate tangible outcomes to meet our shared vision.

Trust of course is very much a two-way street that must be earned and maintained and with this in mind we are keen to see how the Government's recently announced \$13.5 million science plan will address the questions and concerns we and the community have about the planned port development in Cockburn Sound.

Following the Recfishwest Board meeting with the then Fisheries and Ports ministers, we welcomed the announcement of the science plan and also the Government's commitment to enhance the Snapper Guardians and Seeds for Snapper programs.

However, if the community's trust and acceptance of the final plans for the port are to be won, long overdue responses to key questions will need to be addressed by the plan and the Westport Taskforce around the impacts of the development on the Sound's seagrass beds, critical spawning habitat for a host of fish species and recreational fishing access and safety.

As the peak sector body, we will continue to hold decision-makers to account on these critically important questions. As ever, our capacity to advocate for what's important for our community like Cockburn Sound has been greatly strengthened by more supporters, more members and more partners joining us. It truly has been great to see and thanks to all of you who are helping build a fishing movement.

Rest assured, Recfishwest will continue to fly the flag for fishing, taking our responsibility at the seat of the table with the utmost seriousness and highest level of commitment. This is because we remain passionately committed to ensure we can continue to do what we love today and into the future.

CEO'S REPORT

The past year has been both successful and frustrating for Recfishwest and the fishing community of WA. We have had some good wins, yet our sector continues to face challenges.

I'd like to thank our new Chair Liam Surridge for all his efforts in his first year of chairing Recfishwest. With his strong finance background and passion for fishing, Liam's jumped straight into the role, with his professionalism and attention to detail keeping the Recfishwest boat heading in the right direction.

Our Recfishwest team continues to go above and beyond in their efforts to make fishing better in WA. We all love fishing and are passionate about protecting the fishing community's rights and interests. Our culture and focus are as strong as ever and our team continues to develop in their roles in delivering meaningful work.

Our wins

Recfishwest's win highlights this year include:

- The continued recovery of herring stocks saw an increased bag limit from 12 to 20. Herring are the lifeblood of WA and a prized family fish and its recovery should be celebrated.
- Lake Kununurra's barramundi stocking program passed over one million fish stocked into the lake a huge milestone. This has become a great barra fishery and the Kununurra Barramundi Stocking Group and the North West Regional TAFE deserve a round of applause.
- 50,000 yellowtail kingfish' and 100,000 pink snapper were released into Perth waters to build resilience in local fish stocks.
- 177,500 marron were also released through our Peel and South-West regions to enhance freshwater fishing.
- A study funded by the Recreational Fishing Initiatives Fund highlighted that the charter sector generates \$110 million for WA's economy every year, proving an important role in WA's tourism sector.

- The last year of the State-wide FADs trial ended with great community feedback as we look to expand the program.
- In a WA first, Fisheries Minister, Don Punch, launched the Fishing Development Plan for Western Australia, creating a roadmap for delivering bold actions to enhance fishing.
- A recfishing licence-funded project exploring shark deterrent technology to address the mounting shark issue in WA's North delivered positive results. The deterrent results are encouraging, but better science, emerging technology, behaviour change and adaptive management are still required to solve this complex issue.

Our challenges

Some serious challenges also came our way that went against our core values and those of the 700,000 WA recfishers who we represent. The majority of these came from poor management, bad processes and lack of transparency, marginalising the community with minimal regard for their opinion.

- New proposed marine park developments were announced for the south coast and west coast, while we battled away for a better outcome for Kimberley fishers in the proposed Buccaneer Archipelago Marine Parks. The first draft of the new marine parks in the Kimberley were poorly communicated, had below par consultation and didn't acknowledge all users. While we believe this process has now been fixed for future Marine Park engagements, some faith was lost in Government's implementation of future marine parks.
- The WA Environment Minister refused to restore vehicle access to the Hooley Road entrance to Boranup's South Beach after abruptly being blockaded by the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA) in March 2021, despite no environmental or conservation justifications for its closure. Here is another example of a unilateral decision to simply ban an activity which has been undertaken for generations and is an important part of what makes WA great.
- The Ocean Reef marina development removed 12ha of prime abalone habitat from the metro coast. As a result, the almost 20,000 abalone fishers were dealt a 20 per cent reduction in the length of the annual fishing season. We continue to push for an effective resolution of this issue through measures such as an abalone habitat replacement and restocking program.
- The recovery of the west coast demersal scalefish fishery has been a strong focus for Recfishwest since the release of the 2021 stock assessment. While yet to be resolved at the time of writing this report, there is a better way to speed up the recovery of these important fish stocks without the damage a large-scale ban will cause to our way of life and the economy. We will continue to fight for this result on the behalf of all the WA fishing community.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR



REPRESENTATION & CONSULTATION

To represent the views, rights and interests of recreational fishers, Recfishwest consults broadly with the fishing community throughout Western Australia.

We engage with recreational fishers and stakeholders through surveys, meetings, regional consultation activities, correspondence, reference groups, association and industry working groups along with selected workshops and events.

We use this direct contact to collectively gauge the attitudes, drivers, beliefs and aspirations of WA's estimated 700,000+ recreational fishers.

This engagement allows Recfishwest to provide the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) and the Fisheries Minister (along with other decision-makers) with qualified, consolidated advice on a range of recreational fishing-related issues.

As part of this representation and advice Recfishwest continues to:

- Promote and support the interests of the recreational fishing sector and keep them informed;
- Provide strategic leadership for the recreational fishing sector on matters of significance;
- Raise community and sector awareness and advice on a variety of recreational fishing issues;
- Negotiate on behalf of the sector and provide a forum for negotiation/mediation.



WEST COAST DEMERSALS - PROTECTING THE FISH AND THE FISHING EXPERIENCES THEY SUPPORT

Recfishwest developed a package of recommendations informed by an expert working group comprising business owners, charter fishers, fishing clubs, scientists and keen recreational fishers.

Our well-balanced package protects the sustainability and spawning of the fish while delivering the best social and economic benefits, fishing rules, education enhancements and research.

The package was also informed by feedback from Recfishwest's west coast demersal community survey – the biggest response to a survey of this kind in WA's history, some 6,000 respondents strong.

Recfishwest communicated with thousands of fishers concerned about the impact a nine-month closure will have on them and their families, as well as regional caravan park owners, charter operators and tackle shop owners who hold very real concerns about the future of their businesses.

At the time of writing, Recfishwest was working hard to persuade the Government to adopt a sensible approach that protects these highly valued fish without devastating fishing experiences.

PROTECTING OUR MARINE ENVIRONMENTS AND OUR ACCESS TO FISH THEM

Recfishwest worked closely with the Derby and Broome fishing communities along with the Bardi, Jawi, Mayala and Dambimangari Traditional Owners to ensure a better outcome for fishing in the Buccaneer Archipelago Marine Parks.

The original marine park plans in the remote Kimberley archipelago would have seen fishers locked out of 95 per cent of the most valuable fishing waters in the area. Following serious concerns from the local community, Traditional Owners met with local fishing representatives in October, 2021 and along with the community's and Recfishwest's submissions, a better outcome was achieved.

Recfishwest called on the Government for better marine park planning processes and to involve fishers from the start. This appears to have been taken on board with the proposed South Coast and Marmion Marine Park extension planning processes. Both proposed marine parks cover vast areas that are highly important for fishing.

By engaging extensively with both South Coast and North Metro fishing communities on the proposals, our values mapping surveys will help decision-makers better understand areas of importance to fishers in the proposed parks thanks to hundreds of survey submissions.

Recfishwest also welcomed the Environmental Protection Authority's (EPA) August 2021 report on the cumulative impacts of industrial activities and developments proposed for Exmouth Gulf, which recognised the amenity, recreational values and key values that must be protected.

This followed Recfishwest's submission to the EPA that wilderness values strongly underpin the prized fishing that the Gulf has to offer and that industrialising it would compromise that value.

We expressed the fishing community's bitter disappointment at the Environment Minister Reece Whitby's decision to close vehicle access to the Hooley Road entrance to Boranup's South Beach - a popular fishing spot for anglers targeting multiple prized fish species.

Recfishwest raised the closure with the Director General of DBCA along with Environment Ministers Dawson, Sanderson and Whitby and with Fisheries Minister Punch, criticising their unilateral disregard of the area's immense value to the community.









HERRING BAG LIMIT INCREASE AND A STRONG FUTURE FOR 'THE PEOPLE'S FISH'

In a great outcome for WA anglers, the Fisheries Minister followed Recfishwest's recommendation and agreed to increasing the herring bag limit from 12 to 20 from 1 October, 2022.

The recommendation foundations came from 4,000 responses to our herring bag limit survey, showing the community care about 'the people's fish' while the science showed herring have made a strong enough recovery to allow for the bag limit increase and for the stocks to keep growing.

Future management decisions on herring will be guided by future stock assessments, community sentiment and the outcomes of a herring working group, which includes Recfishwest.

PROTECTING COCKBURN SOUND IN THE FACE OF INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT

Recfishwest cautiously welcomed Ports Minister Rita Saffioti's announcement of the State Government's \$13.5 million, multi-year marine science research program focusing on Cockburn Sound.

The announcement followed Recfishwest's meeting with the Fisheries Ministers in December of 2020 seeking answers to serious questions around the impacts of a new port on fish stocks, fish habitats and experiences.

Recfishwest will continue to hold the Government to account and answer questions we have been asking since the Westport process started in 2017 while highlighting the Sound's critical importance to the Perth fishing community.

CALLING FOR TRADITIONAL OWNERS TO BE GIVEN GREATER LEADERSHIP ROLES IN FISHERIES MANAGEMENT

As part of NAIDOC week's theme of "get up, stand up and show up" Recfishwest called for Traditional Owners to be given a greater opportunity to take a leadership role when it comes to the management of WA's aquatic habitats and fisheries.

Through working with Esperance's Tjaltraak Native Title Aboriginal Corporation and the Murujuga Aboriginal Corporation, Recfishwest recognises Traditional Owners' strong knowledge of sea country and aquatic environments should allow their management in protecting sea country and healthy fish populations. We look forward to strengthening our relationships with Traditional Owners in our coastal communities of WA.

HIGHLIGHTING THE VALUE OF THE FISHING TOURISM SECTOR TO THE WA ECONOMY


Recfishwest CEO Dr Andrew Rowland joined the Fisheries Minister and Marine Tourism WA President Matt Howard to announce RFIF-funded research results showing the fishing tourism sector is worth \$110.9 million each year to WA's economy, with charter fishing tours supporting 830 jobs.

The report demonstrates the significant social and economic value charter fishing provides our community from a very small proportion of available fish.

FISHING DEVELOPMENT

Recreational fishing in WA is enjoyed by 700,000+ West Aussies each year and our partnerships with community groups and organisations helps us to direct recreational fishing licence money back into community projects that significantly enhance recreational fishing experiences.

Here are some of the 2021/22 projects making fishing better for the WA community:





LANDMARK DEVELOPMENT PLAN SETS FUTURE AGENDA FOR FISHING IN WA

Recfishwest has developed a comprehensive plan to deliver a set of bold initiatives and actions to help shape and improve WA's fishing future, after the Premier committed to supporting the plan prior to the 2021 election.

The landmark WA Recreational Fishing Development Plan targets better fishing access, less restrictions and places a higher focus on positive fishing experiences, such as through more artificial reefs, FADs and development of freshwater fisheries. It also looks at developing better fishing data and communications.

The plan will guide investments that maximise fishing enjoyment within the boundaries of sustainability, with a key focus on:

- · Better understanding, capturing and promoting all the benefits recreational fishing provides;
- · Maintaining and improving fishing access for both land and boat-based fishers;
- · Stewardship and leadership of recreational fishing; and
- Utilising digital technology in an everchanging world.

The Fisheries Minister stated – "Our recfishing agenda is going to be guided by the recfishing plan that Recfishwest is working on and will really guide the priorities for how we support recfishing into the future."

MORE FISH TO CATCH

Recfishwest continues to drive WA's fish stocking programs by helping to improve fish abundance, stocks and fishing experiences in a changing environment, run in partnership with DPIRD's aquaculture centres and thanks to RFIF funding and support from our community fish stocking partner, Daiwa.

The past year saw over 1.13 million fish and marron stocked around WA's waterways in total, including:

- 100,000 juvenile pink snapper were released into metro waters over four days in February at Cockburn Power Boats Club and Fremantle Sailing Club, with help from club members. This continues the ongoing legacy of Snapper Guardians and has now seen hundreds of thousands of juvenile pink snapper released into the Sound.
- 50,000 juvenile yellowtail kingfish were released in the same club locations as our pink snapper stocks in July and August. As with pink snapper, these yellowtail kingfish also had their otoliths (ear bones) stained, allowing them to be identified when caught for future analysis. We continue to test the efficacy of boosting metro stocks of these fast-growing species.
- 177,500 marron were released into popular south-west dams, thanks to RFIF funding. This great milestone was dampened by DPIRD's last-minute decision to block stocking of marron into Harvey Dam, seemingly based on outdated data. Nevertheless, this was the first time a large-scale marron stocking program was successfully undertaken and we will continue to advocate for initiatives like this to result in year-round marroning.
- More than 350,000 brown and rainbow trout of varying sizes were stocked, thanks to Recfishwest's Freshwater Reference Group and DPIRD's Pemberton Freshwater Research Centre – which celebrated its 50-year milestone of the hatchery being run and operated by the State Government. This fishery brings huge enjoyment to WA's 10,000 licensed freshwater fishers who inject more than \$20 million annually into the regional economy. We continue to work closely with DPIRD to recommend stocking values and locations and there is massive potential for expanding the trout stocking program and fishery in the future.
- 455,000 juvenile barramundi were stocked into Lake Kununurra in the East Kimberley, helping further develop a world-class sport fishery where huge 1.3m barra are regularly caught. This year also saw the community celebrate the millionth barra being stocked since the program a partnership between Recfishwest, the Lake Kununurra Community Stocking Group, North Regional TAFE aquaculture centre and DPIRD was launched in 2013.





HELPING CREATE BETTER PLACES TO FISH

Our three-year pilot FADs program concluding in 2022 was an overwhelming success, providing new opportunities for thousands of anglers from Albany to Broome to target exciting pelagic species like dolphinfish, tuna, Spanish mackerel and cobia.

At the time of writing, Recfishwest was waiting to hear a decision from the State Government on our funding proposal to secure the future of the program State-wide and evolve it further.

Plans were recently unveiled for a new Ammo Jetty in Cockburn Sound – a truly iconic and historical land-based fishing platform for metro fishers chasing herring, skippy, whiting, salmon and even Spanish mackerel. The state-of-the-art design includes a 50-metre long, three-metre-wide T-head and access to 10m deep water, which is in line with feedback from the fishing community and our recommendations made to the jetty design working group.

Recfishwest and our partner organisation Fishability also saw the launch of the MV Fishability in Mandurah, a specially adapted boat to accommodate fishers in wheelchairs. Built by Bouvard Marine and funded with assistance of recreational fishing licence fees through RFIF, this fantastic vessel allows even more people in the Peel region to wet a line and enjoy what fishing has to offer.

Recfishwest welcomed the announcement that fishing access is set to be restored for fishers to the Leschenault Estuary's jetty located south of Bunbury, after the State Government revealed it was committing \$3 million to help rebuild the important land-based fishing spot for locals since its closure in January of 2021.

Stunning pictures taken by underwater photographer Violeta J. Brosig of Blue Media Exmouth shows how much Exmouth's King Reef has flourished into a thriving, healthy marine oasis. Since its deployment less than four years ago, King Reef has become the fastest developing artificial reef in Australia, hosting more than 100 fish species. It highlights the importance and role of repurposed structures for boosting fish habitats while providing additional social, economic and environmental benefits for local communities.

Recfishwest continues to enhance WA's marine habitats with a number of artificial reefs for fishing under development. Although no new reefs hit the sea floor this year, we're targeting numerous Commonwealth and State Government approvals for new reefs in Carnarvon, Albany, Broome, Onslow, Dampier and Kalbarri to add to the seven reefs currently thriving in WA waters.

We also have projects looking to repurpose offshore steel infrastructure and turn them into fishing reefs in the State's North-West, through partnerships with the resources sector and local fishing communities. As leaders in the artificial reef field, we're investigating how to retain these structures through the best environmental practices to create new fishing opportunities for our community around the State. Watch this space in 2023!

The past year saw Lake Kununurra make huge strides forward in becoming Australia's premier world-class barramundi sport fishery in a safe, saltwater croc-free, accessible and stunning setting, working closely in partnership with the Lake Kununurra Barramundi Stocking Group (LKBSG), North Regional TAFE, DPIRD and DBCA.

As part of a RFIF funding initiative, Recfishwest has worked with the LKBSG to launch a new website to help promote the fishery, along with our suite of promotional media activities to help put Lake Kununurra on the State and national fishing map.



SHARK BITE-OFF - GETTING OUR TEETH INTO A WICKED PROBLEM

The impact of sharks biting off hooked fish continues to be the number one issue for the WA fishing community located north of Geraldton.

While this is a highly complex issue with no one silver bullet solution – some headway has been made in testing the efficacy of emerging shark deterrent devices through DPIRD's RFIF-funded study that found shark depredation can decrease by as much as 65 per cent when a deterrent is used. Recfishwest continues to look at a range of other shark deterrent devices that are being developed or have already entered the market.

We are promoting practical approaches and tips that can be adopted by fishers to reduce instances of bite-off, such as a video with Miami Tackle World's Ashley Ramm showing fishers how to rig anti-shark bite-off gear most effectively. We're also advocating for better understanding of shark populations and behaviour while improving fisher education to address the issue and protect the social and economic benefits fishing provides.

At the 2021 Annual General Meeting, the Recfishwest Board bestowed Life Membership on 'Sewelly' in recognition of his tireless voluntary work, commitment, leadership and passion for Recfishwest over a number of years in many different capacities.

Sewelly was a member of the Recreational Fishing Advisory Committee when he was 19 years old and first joined the Recfishwest Board in 1999. He has since held multiple positions across four different terms as a Director and on multiple Board sub-committees. He continues to represent fishers' interests through his role as Chair of the Recfishwest Freshwater Fishing Reference Group.

Ian has represented WA at a national fly-fishing tournament level, as well as helping establish bream fishing tournaments in WA. He was also the co-founder and editor of the highly-regarded Western Australian Fishing Magazine.

EVENTS & COMMUNITY

Recfishwest attended and hosted numerous community events throughout the year. Whether it be stocking fish or introducing families to fishing, we're always striving to protect, promote and develop sustainable, accessible, enjoyable and safe fishing for the benefit of the community.

Here are some of the face-to-face fishing engagement activities we have been involved in during 2021/22:



The 2021 Fish in the 'Burbs event saw four free fishing clinics targeting rainbow trout near Mandurah completely booked out.

More than 100 youngsters took part in the clinics held in partnership with the Shire of Murray, which was a huge hit with the locals and provided them with great opportunities to catch this magnificent species not far from their homes.

We once again ran our Awesome Autumn of Salmon celebration with more than 2,500 anglers participating in our app-driven, three-month long Salmon Slam 2022 event supported this year by Shimano and Western Angler as well as a host of other sponsors from the fishing tackle and outdoors industry. This event continues to highlight the importance and broad appeal of this southern fishing icon that sees fishers inject \$331 million into the regional economy ever year.

Our Fishing for Science program run in partnership with Woodside Energy continues to be well supported by local fishers who handed Recfishwest staff their captured fish to allow scientific data to be collected at several regional fishing tournaments including GAMEX and the Dampier Classic.

Despite gloomy weather conditions, more than 200 people attended the 2021 Troutfest event at Drakesbrook Weir and helped release more than a thousand brown and rainbow trout into the dam. This muchloved community event run in partnership with the Shire of Waroona and Alcoa is a celebration of the South-West's fantastic freshwater fishery stocked by DPIRD in close consultation with Recfishwest's Freshwater Reference Group.



While COVID restrictions sadly prevented us once again from running our Snapper Guardians community pink snapper release event, we were able to hold family-friendly snapper and yellowtail kingfish releases at Cockburn Power Boats Club and Fremantle Sailing Club. We presented these events through 'Facebook live' allowing people to 'tune into' the event in real time on social media or watch it afterwards at their leisure.

SAFE FISHING

Safe fishing remains a top priority for Recfishwest and a pillar of our strategic plan. Recfishwest continues to work tirelessly to promote the need for safe fishing behaviour to be part of every fishing experience, drive behaviour change towards safe fishing, model safe fishing experiences, provide high quality safety equipment at a low cost to the recreational fishing community and invest in safety infrastructure across the State.

In 2021/22 as part of our State-wide Safe Fishing Strategy, funded through the Recreational Fishing Initiatives Fund, Recfishwest:

Partnered with the Bureau of Meteorology to develop and trial a "HEADS UP" alert for dangerous fishing conditions. In collaboration with BoM and Royal Life Saving Western Australia, alerts were issued via social media to warn fishers of hazardous conditions in advance, as forecasted by the BoM.

campaign through our own communication channels and through media in partnership with Western Angler, DPIRD and DBCA promoting 'keeping the sand between your toes' and fishing from the beach instead of the rocks.

Undertook an extensive salmon season safety

Extended the reach of messages to CALD (Culturally and Linguistically Diverse Groups) through increased multilingual advertising in collaboration with Chinese newspaper Perth Epoch Times.

Ran a safe abalone fishing campaign in association with Surf Life Saving WA.

Explored innovative new rock fishing safety technology developed by Carnegie Energy.

Undertook numerous communications and media interviews with Channel Seven, Nine, the ABC, 6PR and others around promoting boat and rock fishing safety.

Recfishwest, along with community partners and tackle shops, continued to provide the State's recfishers with free loan lifejackets across WA. There are 176 loan lifejackets available between Quobba and Esperance.

Recfishwest alongside community partners continued to monitor and maintain our State-wide Angel Ring program, providing replacement rings to numerous high risk rock fishing locations statewide.

Worked alongside Royal Life Saving Western Australia helping to deliver their 'make the right call' safety campaign, promoting safe fishing practices. Recfishwest and Western Rock Lobster continued the 'Snag It, Tag It' safety initiative to combat the dangers of snagged fishing gear on rock lobster pots, distributing Snag It, Tag It tags at more than 50 tackle shops across the State.

Our heartfelt thanks to local communities, land managers, Government agencies and our ambassadors in their continued efforts and support of the State-wide Safe Fishing Strategy.









SUNSMART FISHING CLINICS

This financial year, 36 fishing clinics were held across WA from Bremer Bay to Dampier. COVID-19 presented challenges and multiple clinics were rescheduled or cancelled, however, more clinics and events were held than the previous financial year and the success of the clinics is a testament of our volunteers and fishing clinic instructors' hard-work.








FINANCIAL STATEMENTS & GOVERNANCE

Notes to the Financial Statements

WA Recreational and Sportfishing Council For the year ended 30 June 2022

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements are prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act Western Australia 2015. The Board have determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

Income Tax

The Council is exempt from Income Tax.

Trade and Other Receivables

Trade receivables and other receivables are recognised at the nominal transaction value without taking into account the time value of money. If required a provision for doubtful debts has been created.

Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

PPE is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Employee Provisions

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Long service leave is calculated at current rates based upon 13 weeks leave after 10 years.

Provisions
